# Deeside Naturalists' Society Species Report 2009



#### Introduction

The aim of this report is to produce an over all record of the birds seen on the Deeside Naturalists' Reserve at Connah's Quay Power Station, and the adjacent RSPB reserve of Oakenhalt Marsh. For the purpose of the report, Oakenhalt Marsh and the adjoining saltmarsh are included, as hides on the reserve over look this area and many records are submitted for these area.

This report is not a complete journal of every sighting, but has been written as a guide to the sightings of 2009 and where the best place to see each species may be on the reserve. The 'Where to see on the reserve' section has been compiled from 2009 and where necessary previous years records as well as the experience of the author over the last 5 years. This is by no means an accurate location guide, and will hopefully improve in future reports.

First bird of the year was seen on 30/03 (KLJ & BH) with a single bird seen over the Ash Pool field. Last record was on 08/09 (DN) with 20 birds seen over Oakenhalt Marsh. A count of 200 birds was recorded on 31/07 (JH) over the Ash Pool. A count of 2000 birds in August was made by an unknown observer.

There were 27 records with most records being from the Ash Pool compartment. This species often uses the fencing on the reserve when small groups are forming in late summer/early Autumn before their migration south.

#### Where to see on the reserve

Ash Pool compartment and the Bunded pools. Larger numbers are recorded late summer.

#### Where to see on the reserve

This is a species that is generally seen from the West hide on the mud flats at low tide and Oakenholt Marsh salt marsh at high tide. It is possible this species could also be seen from the hides over looking the Bunded pools.

This species was recorded in every month of 2009 apart from January. The peak count of 800 was during a WEBS high tide survey with the birds roosting on Oakenholt Marsh (AW). Other high counts were 200 seen on 07/06 (AW), 200 on 30/07 (UO), 160 seen on 17/10 (GEM) and 108 on 07/06 (AW).

#### Where to see on the reserve

This species can be seen almost anywhere on the reserve. At low tide birds can be seen feeding or loafing on the exposed sand banks of the River Dee. During the summer months Black-headed gulls can be seen hawking for flying insects over the river and Ash Pool, and feeding on the Bunded Pools.

Black-tailed Godwit can be seen from the reserve hides all year round but the larger flocks are seen during Spring and Autumn Migration. There is a sizeable summer flock consisting of what are probably non-breeding birds that appears to alternate between the River Dee mudflats and RSPB Inner Marsh farm. Three counts of 5000 birds were made, all in October, on 10/10 (GR & SG), 19/10 (UO) and 21/10 (RE). The largest count of birds in the spring was of 1270 birds seen on 14/04 (PDS).

There were a total of 21 counts of 1000+ birds in 2009 with 17 of these made between August and November, the remaining four were of flocks seen in April and May. The largest flock to be seen on the reserve pools consisted of 1000 birds seen on the Ash Pool Island on 02/05 (ES).

Smaller numbers of birds were recorded on the Bunded pools with a high count of 300 on 09/09 (DN) seen from the Middle hide and 200 on 15/11 (DN) seen from the East Hide. All records from the Bunded pools were from August to November, the first records being 2 birds seen by an Unknown Observer on 18/08.

# Where to see on the reserve

This species can be seen from most of the hides on the reserve and the access road running parallel to the river. At low tide Black-tailed godwit can be seen feeding on the mud flats in large flocks, or roosting at the waters edge in a more compact group. As the tide moves in birds can often be seen feeding on the retreating mudflats until the water is right up to their belly. High tides in Autumn and early winter can see substantial flocks roosting on Oakenhalt Marsh, best viewed from the West Hide. This species also roosts on the Ash pool Island and can be seen feeding in the fields either side of the helipad and the scrapes in the

Ash Pool field. Although not as common on the Bunded pools, large flocks can often be seen in the Autumn as they are forced off the River Dee mudflats by the rising tide.

It appears this species is significantly under recorded. Although nest box records cannot confirm breeding on the reserve, the number of nest boxes used indicates it was possible breeding occurred during 2009.

All but two of the records from 2009 were from the 'New Hide' over looking the feeding station. However the highest count of 9 birds was recorded on a walk from the West Hide to the Nature Trail (GEM).

#### Where to see on the reserve

Blue tits can be seen from most places on the reserve where their are sufficient trees and hedgerows. A number of nest boxes are placed around the reserve which provide possible nesting opportunities. However, the best place to see this species is the feeding station located near to the 'New' hide over looking the Bunded pools.

All sightings were of single birds seen on Oakenhalt Marsh on 09/05 and 06/12 (both PDS) rather unusually a bird seen from the Middle Hide over looking the Bunded pools on 24/05 (TL & SL).

The bird seen on Oakenhalt Marsh on 09/05 was a Light-bellied Brent Goose.

# Where to see on the reserve

There is a wintering population of approximately 150 at Hilbre Island and these birds occasionally wander further into the estuary. Brent Geese are usually seen on the River or Oakenhalt Marsh.

Successfully hatched at least 4 Goslings, but only 1 was seen in June. There is no evidence to suggest this bird did not fledge successfully. Most summer records are from the Wetland meadow and Ash pool, when larger flocks gather these tend to be on the Oakenhalt Marsh and River Dee sandbanks at low tide.

There were large flocks recorded in Autumn, with 1000 seen on 08/09 (DN), 4500 on 22/09 (PDS) and 2000 seen on 05/10 (UO).

Unusually there were no sightings during the winter months.

#### Where to see on the reserve

Large flocks gather to roost and graze on Oakenhalt Marsh during Autumn, during the summer the best place to see Canada Goose is the Ash Pool field and pool.

Almost certainly under recorded, Carrion crow can be seen on most visits either feeding around the sheep fields or flying around other parts of the reserve. Thirty six birds were seen on 17/10 (GEM) but this is by far the norm. This species is usually only seen in 1's or 2's although there were other high counts of 9 on 12/04 (AW) and 11 on 18/10 (AW).

# Where to see on the reserve

Carrion crow can been seen almost anywhere on the reserve, although the Sheep fields either side of the Helipad are usually the best place.

All but two of the records were from the area surrounding the bird feeding station located by the new hide. Twenty birds were recorded on 15/03 (AW) and 15 on 22/11 (AW) all from the feeding station. Records away from this area were a single bird by the Middle hide on 22/03 (AW) and 04/05 (GEM) and 12 birds recorded on a walk of the reserve from West Hide to Nature trail on 17/10 (GEM). Most records are of small groups (between 4 and 6 birds) around the feeding station. The low number of records suggests this species is under recorded. No evidence of breeding was recorded although there is suitable habit available.

#### Where to see on the reserve

Chaffinch are mainly seen around the feeding station feeding on food dropped from the hanging feeders. They can also be seen in any area where there are sufficient trees and hedgerows to provide food and roosting. Male's can be seen singing during the spring from the trees along the Bunded pools.

Only seven records suggests this species is under recorded. The high count of 9 birds was on 17/10 (GEM). There were five records of single birds and a record of 5 birds seen on 22/1 (AW).

#### Where to see on the reserve

Almost any hedgerow on the reserve, usually singularly but sometimes in pairs of small groups. Birds can often be seen foraging for food around the feeding station.

Probably the easiest raptor to see on the reserve, Buzzards can be seen perching on fence posts surrounding the reserve or soaring over the Sheep fields and Oakenhalt Marsh. Most commonly recorded in singles but it is not unusual to see 2 or 3 birds soaring together. Counts of 2 birds were recorded on seven occasions, 3 birds recorded on two occasions and 4 birds were seen on 08/02 (JB & TB).

#### Where to see on the reserve

Usually seen perched on the fence posts that surround the Sheep fields either side of the helipad and the Ash Pool or soaring above the reserve and Oakenhalt Marsh.

Only four sightings recorded with two records in Spring and two records in late Summer, all records were of single birds.

The first bird of the year was seen on 15/03 (SS) by the Middle hide with another in the same area recorded on 21/03 (AN).

There were two records a month apart from the area around the New hide with birds seen on the 09/08 (GEM) and 09/09 (DN).

#### Where to see on the reserve

Common Chiffchaff can be seen in any area of the reserve where there is hedgerow or trees. In Spring birds can be heard singing along the Nature Trail and the area of scrub at the southern end of the Ash Pool.

Common coot successfully bred on the reserve in 2009, with young seen on the Ash Pool on 25/04 (JH), 28/04 (JH), 06/05 (GP), 10/05 (KG), 18/05 (JH), and 12/08 (UO). Chicks seen in August suggest a second brood. Numbers of Coot are highest in the Winter months when the Ash pool can see counts regularly reach 40 or 50 birds. There were 3 counts of 40 birds on 08/02 (GEM), 26/07 (AW) and 30/07 (UO), and a single count of 50 birds on 11/09 (UO).

All records were from the Ash Pool compartment, with the Ash Pool being the main area used by this species. At least one pair can usually be seen on the North Scrape either from the West Hide or the Wetland meadow hide.

#### Where to see on the reserve

This species is almost exclusively seen in the Ash Pool compartment.

Common Greenshank is a species that appears to be attracted to the DNS reserve over other suitable habitats in the area, a high count of 27 is down on previous years but appears to be higher than other sites on the Dee Estuary and in North Wales.

Greenshank were seen in every month of the year except June suggesting birds seen in May are late birds on migration north and sightings in July are of early breeders returning south. Peak numbers are seen in late summer, with 10 or more birds seen on 14 occasions in August and September. The high count of 27 birds was recorded on 17/09 with 5 birds seen from the East hide and 22 birds seen from the middle hide (KLJ & BH).

The first record of the year was a single bird on the Bunded Pools, seen from the new hide on 21/01 (CH & RH) and the last record was on 31/12 with 2 birds seen from the middle hide (JH).

Five records were from Oakenhalt Marsh with single birds see on 26/03 (PDS), 08/08 (UO), 04/12 (UO), 2 birds seen on 11/09 (UO) and of 3 birds on 09/09 (DN). Two records were received from the Ash pool complex with single birds seen on 28/07 (PDS) and 04/08 (UO), all other records were of birds seen on the Bunded Pools.

#### Where to see on the reserve

The primary area for sightings is the Bunded pool complex where birds can be seen roosting at 'Greenshank Corner' from the middle hide and feeding from any of the hides over looking the pools. Sightings of Greenshank from the West Hide are usually of birds feeding in the channels at Low Tide.

A total of eleven records were received for 2009, with a high count of 30 birds recorded. All records were from the Ash Pool compartment. The first record of the year was for 16 birds seen on 25/04 (JH), with the last being a single bird seen on 30/07 (UO).

#### Where to see on the reserve

Most Hirundine sightings on the reserve are of birds over the Ash Pool complex, feeding over the Ash Pool itself. It is possible to see House Martin's collecting mud from the exposed low tide mud banks, this is best seen from the West Hide in April/May.

Unusually there were no sightings from January to April, with the first record a single bird seen on 07/05 (DC & SC). There were records of 2 birds on five occasions. Only three records were from Oakenhalt Marsh.

# Where to see on the reserve

Common Kestrel can be seen hunting the marsh adjacent to the access road between the West hide and the New Hide/Feeding station, often using trees and fence posts. Less regularly they can be seen over the Bunded Pool and Ash Pool complexes. Sightings of birds over Oakenhalt Marsh are usually of birds at the West end of the marsh.

An unusual trend over the last few years is the lack of sightings of Common Kingfisher in the first half of the year. Birds are seen fairly regularly from Lat summer onwards, but records stop abruptly at the end of December. Is this under recording, or do the birds go elsewhere?

First record from 2009 was a single bird seen at the Ash Pool compartment on 30/06 (NH). There were twenty one further records of single birds until 2 birds were seen on 20/09 (UO & BD), in total there were three records of 2 birds. All ten records from Oakenhalt Marsh were probably of birds using the Paper mill channel for feeding.

# Where to see on the reserve

Kingfisher can be seen sitting on the sluice gates at either end of the Bunded Pools, using the water level markers for perches or flying up and down the 'Paper mill' channel outside the West Hide. Occasionally birds can be seen on the Ash Pool using the reeds as a perch. The pool in front of the Visitor Centre is also a popular place for a fishing Kingfisher, where they use the outlet pipe, rocks and fallen branches to perch.

Generally seen in flocks, Linnet can be seen feeding on the salt marsh vegetation at low tide or can often been seen perching on the reserve fences running along the access roads.

#### Where to see on the reserve

Goosander breed on the River Dee (a long way up stream) but are rarely seen on or around the reserve. Sightings in recent years have been of birds on Oakenhalt Marsh or roosting on the Bunded Pools, usually in the Winter months when frozen rivers force the birds down stream.

Common redshank is one of the commonest and most easily identifiable species seen on or from the reserve. It's bright orange legs and bill can easily be picked out as birds feed along the waters edge, in channels in the salt marsh or roost in groups of 100 or so at high tide. The Dee Estuary is an internationally important site for this species.

Records were received from every month other than January and May. The lack of records for January is probably under-recording, but the lack of records from May is likely to be down to birds moving away from coastal areas to breed.

The highest counts for each month can be seen in the table above. Counts of over 1000 birds were recoded on nine occasions between 07/08 (JH) and 10/10 (GR). There were 22 counts of 300 - 800 birds with 21 of these occurring during late Summer and Autumn migration, the single spring record was of 400 birds seen on 26/03 (PDS).

#### Where to see on the reserve

Common redshank can be seen feeding on the exposed mud flats of the River Dee and the Salt Marsh at low tide from the access road. The channel running past the West Hide can hold good numbers of roosting birds at Low tide and during a rising tide. Birds can also be seen feeding in the channels of Oakenhalt Marsh and along the edge of the Bunded pools. During August large flocks can gather on the Bunded Pool islands as birds are pushed off the River Dee sand banks during high tide.

A significant increase in records of birds from 2008 also saw a huge jump in the peak count, with 100 birds seen on 21/08 (JH). This record was not a one off high count with flocks of 45 or more birds seen on five occasions between 31/07 (GEM) and 23/08 (AW). Counts of 100 on 21/08 and 90 on 23/08 show the birds were present for a few days at least and suggest a build up of post breeding birds from July into August. All records of large flocks were from the Oakenhalt Marsh area. The 90 birds recorded on 23/08 were recorded roosting with Dunlin towards the railway line during high tide.

Away from Oakenhalt Marsh, two records of single birds were received of birds seen on the Bunded pools on 13/07 (SD) and 17/10 (GEM).

#### Where to see on the reserve

Ringed Plover are usually encountered in small numbers on the sandbanks of the River Dee at low tide. Occasionally birds are seen on the Bunded pools, or roosting on Oakenhalt Marsh at high tide. 2009 proved to be a good year for this species.

Most regularly seen in flocks, Starling can be seen almost anywhere on the reserve, although favour the fields and Marsh areas. Flocks of 100 birds or more were recorded on 11 occasions, with the largest flocks of 300 birds occurring on three occasions 09/09 (DN), 11/09 (UO) and 22/11 (AW), each from a different area of the reserve Ash Pool 09/09, Bunded Pools 11/09 and Oakenhalt Marsh 22/11.

Juvenile birds were recorded in August with 12 seen on 12/08 (UO) and 40 on 15/08 (JH). There is no evidence of breeding on the reserve so these records probably relate to a build up of birds in last summer when flocks form to roost in the reed bed of the Ash Pool.

# Where to see on the reserve

Starling can often be seen roosting in mixed flocks with Northern lapwing on the Ash Pool field and Oakenhalt Marsh in Winter. Flocks form on the fencing along the access road to the West hide in late summer. Throughout the rest of the year birds can be seen almost anywhere on the reserve but tend to favour the fields and salt-marsh.

Sightings of Little grebe were from the Ash pool and Bunded pool compartments. Records from the winter periods are almost exclusively of birds on the Bunded pools, whilst records from the summer months are of birds on the Ash pool.

Four birds were recorded on three occasions, with birds seen on the Ash pool on 15/03 (AW), 12/06 (UO) and 27/07 (JMc & DMc). Three birds were seen on 14 occasions and 2

birds were noted on 35 occasions. Although no evidence of breeding was recorded Little Grebe are likely to have bred on the Ash pool in 2009.

Sky lark can seen singing high above the salt marsh and fields on sunny Spring and Summer days. Small flocks are often pushed up from the salt-marsh at high tide.

The Bunded pools is one of the best areas to see Spotted redshank in the region, and the number of records and high counts for 2009 show why, forty four records were received for the reserve between July and December with thirty eight of these from the Bunded pools with 8 or more birds seen on six occasions. Eight birds were seen on 04/09 (GEM), 18/09 (PDS & AW) and 01/10 (UO), there were 12 on 25/09 (SS) and 11 birds on 10/10 (SS).

Away from the Bunded pools, 6 birds were seen on Oakenhalt marsh on 26/03 (PDS), 11 birds on 19/10 (UO) and 5 on 04/12 (PDS).

#### Where to see on the reserve

Spotted redshank can be seen from the Bunded pools where they like to roost in the furthest right hand corner of the middle pool as viewed from the middle hide. They can also be seen feeding in the channel that runs in front of the West hide at low tide.
